

26. brief description (note unusual features, integrity, environment, threats and associated buildings) Sited on a hill off of Scaife Road overlooking a valley to the NW, this is a cruciform-shaped 2 1/2 story house with eclectic stylistic origins. Frame, the house has been shelthed in aluminum siding, with replacement soffit and fascia. Its wide gambrel roof, running N-S, has 4 stone chimneys (see site plan). It is critersected by a wide, pedimented gable projecting on the W elevation, containing an elliptical window flanked by oculi. The 9-bay facade on this elevation features d/s (12/1) windows, primarily. Palladian elements include the modified Palladian windows of the gable dormers, the Palladian windows sans arch flanking the central 3 bays on the second story, and the bull's eyes flanking the gable end ellipse. Windows have heavily articulated surrounds, and the central three bays are defined by fluted pilasters. The main door, in central bay, has an elliptical fan light and sidelights. 27. history, significance and/or background Though aluminum sided, the house retains its stylistic elements which, in this eclectic combination, are unique in the area. Originally the cornice was dentilled, and balconied porches extended on S and W elevation. It was the home of Charles C. Scaife in 1902, president of Wm. B. Scaife & Sons Co., manufacturers of tanks and steel buildings. Scaife's Pittsburgh residence was at 1136 Western Avenue in Allegheny City, now Pittsburgh's North Side. gable; the roofline flares out just beneath. There are French doors on the first story, as well as varied and asymmetrical fenestration on the S end.

The E elevation has a central, projecting pedimented gable, with a double casement window replacing the ellipse on the W side. On the second story, large leaded windows are on all sides. Another pedimented gable bay projects on SE corner.

The most interesting feature is the porte-cochere extending from the central bay of the E elevation. Supported by four stone piers, it is a stick-style shelter with gable roof. Gable ends feature a carved fan motif, above a pent roof.
